

**International Summer Course on Communication for Development
Under the Global Initiative for Academic Networks (GIAN)
A REPORT**

Introduction:

Since at least the mid-20th century, communication has been recognized as essential to human development and positive social change. Yet the way, in which its role is conceived has varied widely, shaped by government system and policy, socio-economic and cultural contexts and the agendas and funding cycles of donor agencies. Today, the field of communication for development (C4D) includes a range of approaches and strategies—from national health promotion campaigns to small-scale NGO and community-based initiatives and low-cost SMS communications. In some C4D programmes, communication remains essentially one-way (usually top-down); other programmes are more participatory and interactive in their approach to needs assessment, planning, design and implementation.

For governments and some international organizations, development has often been defined in macro-economic terms—measured by Gross Domestic Product (GDP), poverty levels or consumer spending. This course has attempted to situate development within a human-rights framework in areas such as education, public health, nutrition, water and sanitation, environmental protection, conflict resolution, gender equality, and the building of self-sustaining political and civil institutions. It presented C4D as a strategy that, depending on the context and need, can be applied both at the downstream (local and community) and upstream (policy and advocacy) levels.

Objectives of the Course:

1. To understand key concepts and theories in the fields of communication and development, their historical origins and influence.
2. To critically analyze the role communication can play in promoting and supporting social change.
3. To examine theoretical and methodological approaches to communication for development and social change.
4. To review and critique communication strategies and campaigns to address specific social development needs.
5. To understand how the forces of economic, technological and cultural globalization are shaping the world and to assess future communication and development challenges.

- Formative research and Situation analysis in C4D Strategy design and Planning for C4D intervention, Levels of intervention and role of information technology
- Designing theme based messages and dialogic communication material
- Monitoring and evaluation – setting objectives, indicators and techniques

The Faculty of the Course:

Prof. David Mould

Dr. David Mould, Scripps College of Communication, Ohio University has served at Ohio University for 30 years in different capacities, as a full-time faculty member, as Associate Director of the school, as a founding faculty member of the Global Learning Community (now the Global Leadership Center), as Director of the master's program in Communication and Development Studies, and finally (2005-2010) as Associate Dean for Research and Graduate Studies of the Scripps College of Communication. A double Fulbright Scholar in 1996 and 2011, he has worked for the past 16 years as an international media trainer and consultant, mostly in Central and Southeast Asia, for UNESCO, USAID, UNICEF, IREX, USIS, Asia-Pacific Institute for Broadcasting Development (AIBD) and Open Society Institute.

Dr. Joya Chakraborty

Dr. Joya Chakraborty is an Assistant Professor at the Dept. of Mass Communication and Journalism, Tezpur University. She has been associated with various community media projects over the last ten years. Her research interests include ICT for Development, Cultural diversity and new media, Information and Knowledge Societies in transition, Sociology of communication technology and media, gender and ICT, Children and media participation.

Course Structure and Approach:

The course used the principles of action or discovery learning, encouraging participants to learn through the investigation and discussion of case studies, scenarios and realistic problems from the field of C4D, and to share their perspectives and experiences. The facilitator has made presentations on key topics in C4D, followed by guided discussions and group exercises designed to reinforce inquiry and encourage debate on theoretical, programmatic and ethical issues.

General Note:

The participants of the GIAN C4D course were from across the country and most of the participants were pursuing their PhD from various institutions like IIT Patna, Central University of Odisha, Jharkhand Central University, Jamia Milia Islamia etc. Various faculty members from universities like Banaras Hindu College, Osmania University, Manipur University, Central University of Orissa were also participants of the course. The full list of participants has been attached in the Annexure 1.

The inaugural ceremony of Global Initiative Academic Network (GIAN) took place on the very first day of the 10 days course i.e. on 6th June, 2016 at 10 am in the screening hall of the Department of Mass Communication and Journalism. Prof. Manabendra Bhuyan, Pro Vice-chancellor Tezpur University; Prof. P J Mahanta, Dean School of Humanities and Social Sciences; Prof. Sunil Kanta Behera, Professor of Eminence and Dr. Abhijit Bora, Head Dept. of MCJ were present in the inaugural ceremony apart from the Course Coordinator Dr. Joya Chakraborty and the Foreign Expert Prof. David H Mould.

The formal session of the course began at 11.30 am in the morning on 6th June, 2016. The schedule of the course was as followed-

Morning 10:00-1:00 (with break)

Lunch 1:00-2:30

Afternoon 2:30-4:30 (on all days, the facilitator held office hour, 4:30-5:30)

Day by day schedule is attached in the annexure 2.

The course was a participative one where all the participants have conducted various group exercises, made presentations, and were made to think critically on various given situations. The course ended on 16th June, 2016 and on the last day the participants were asked to present the case study of a project.

The closing ceremony of the course started at 4.30 pm in the evening on the same day. The Vice-Chancellor of the university, Prof. Mihir Kanti Chaudhuri, local co-ordinator of GIAN Prof. Nayandeep Deka Baruah, Prof. Sunil Kanta Behera, Dr. Abhijit Bora and other faculty members of the department attended the Valedictory function.

After the Vice Chancellor's speech on the occasion, participants were asked to share their experiences regarding the course as well as on their stay at the university campus. The certificates of the course were distributed by the Vice Chancellor of the University, Head of the Department, the GIAN local coordinator and Prof. Mould.

After the completion of the course, feedback from all the participants was sought on both logistical as well as academic parameters. The feedback form is attached in the Annexure-3. In the feedback form the participants have mentioned that their expectation from the course was met to a great extent. Topics like C4D models and theories, behavioural

theories, participatory learning theory, information about social norms and practices, developing questionnaire for community, human development index measure, various group activities, developing a C4D model etc. were found most relevant by the participants to their study areas as well as in teaching areas. They also said that the facilitators of the course were very much approachable at any point of time, rich in knowledge on the field, good speaker, energetic, friendly, having a sense of humour, made the course interesting, clarified the minute doubts, and were intellectual persons.
