Overview

As a teacher and choreographer with more than forty years' experience I have been involved in curriculum development and teaching at tertiary (university) level for many years, establishing two degree programmes in Dance Studies in Unitec, Auckland (now in its 31st year) and The University of Otago. From 1997 to 2018 I was Lecturer, then Senior Teaching Fellow in Dance Studies at the University of Otago and was chair of the Dance Studies programme from 1997-1998; 2005-2008 and from 2011-2018. As a community dance worker in the 80s I initiated a number of community dance programmes to meet the specific needs of the blind, deaf, physically and intellectually disabled, mothers and babies, pre-schoolers, primary and high school students, the elderly, country folk and city dance professionals.

As a practicing artist I have, since, 1980, produced over twenty-five inter-disciplinary dance/music performance works involving a large number of renowned NZ artists and toured the country with my companies Origins Dance Theatre and DanceSpeak Dunedin. I have also directed and produced numerous Student public choreographic Performances.

I am still a practicing Improvisational performance artist and movement researcher whose current interests are now directed towards marrying my artistic practice with my academic writing, research and teaching. To this end I have designed an original Intuitive Ethnogaphy methodology which supports research in cultural studies, history, anthropology and the biological and somatic sciences.

Teaching:

My teaching philosophies are firmly grounded in ecological theory and informed by my artistic practice which, in turn, forms the basis of my educational research. I espouse a broad curriculum base and a teaching methodology that encourages a co-operative and participatory learning environment where creative thinking and a diversity of learning styles and viewpoints are valued. I believe that humanities and social sciences education in general should explicitly include an ethics of relationship and care, involving a conscious understanding of self in relation to others and the environment. **Other comments:** My published book, *Teaching Dance as if the World Matters: A Design for teaching Dancemaking for the 21st century.* Lambert Press, Germany (East, 2011), lays out my philosophical ideas regarding dance, art and education. In it I propose, what I have termed, an Eco-choreography Pedagogy for the teaching of Dance Studies.

More recently, my research has investigated the role of intuition within teaching and performing and the ways that improvised performance may become a site for practicing ethics, social justice and democracy. My arguments lend support for somatic dance improvisation as a practice-based research methodology. I elaborate on this idea in my recent publications: *Home Imagined: Uncovering a Sensuous history of People and Place through Eco-somatic Improvisation* (2018) and *Intuitive Ethnography; Ecosomatic Improvisation as Radical Pedagogy and Body Centred Research Method*. Chapter Intuitive Ethnography: An Eco-somatic Methodology (in press). (Refer to CV below).

Research Overview:

My teaching and research are closely connected and my most recent publications have made original contributions to innovative teaching methodologies within higher education. For example, I have published articles on the efficacy of situated or trans-locational learning (my term) and the influence of local cultural and geographic landscape on teaching and learning of dance and somatic practices, though these ideas may be applied to 'situated learning' in general.

In recognition of my expertise in ecological dance pedagogy and somatic dance education I have been invited to contribute chapters to three international volumes (see research publications section).Between 2012 and 2018 I published 8 peer reviewed journal articles and presented at over fourteen international conferences. I presented five inter-disciplinary performance events and produced ten concerts of students' work.

Since my retirement from The University of Otago I have taught a number of international and local workshops (including Tuscany, Vienna, Czechia, USA and Auckland. I have hosted three international conferences, led two student ethnographic field trips abroad (to India) and hosted two William Evans Fellows. I have examined two Phd theses (University of Tezpur, India), three Master's theses (UV of Auckland and Waikato, NZ) and supervised five postgraduate projects. I have been invited to present talks and teaching sessions at a number of universities. Including the University of Tezpur, Assam; the University of Dibrugarh, Assam, the Royal Global University, Guwahati, Assam and the University of Greensboro, North Carolina, USA. I also presented a guest seminar at The University of Otago (International Initiatives Seminar Series, 2016).

During my 24 year tenure at Otago I taught two first semester and two second semester papers annually at 100 to 500 level, supervised student projects and participated fully in the restructuring process of the School of Physical Education, Sport and Exercise Sciences. I have served as Chair of the Dance Studies programme at various stages over the past twenty four years and was a board member for the Bachelor of Performing Arts Degree (Humanities).

I am an active member of three dance organisations: TDENNZA Tertiary Dance Educators Network, Aotearoa, NZ; DANZ Dance Aotearoa; NDEO National Dance Educators of America. I am regularly called upon as a consultant in national and local dance affairs. From 2005-2018 I served on the selection panels for the Dunedin Fringe Arts Festival and the Caroline Plummer Community Dance Fellowship Committee, OU.
