PREFACE

This Report has been prepared by the cadets of NCC Tezpur University and it consists of all the details of the functioning of the Unit from August 2019 to July 2020. It tries to briefly give an overview of all the events that were organised by NCC Tezpur University or the events in which our cadets participated on.

It is especially important to note that, this report will only give a brief idea about the work and dedication of our cadets for the improvement of our University and NCC. This report also shows NCC is full of opportunities and how it plays an important role in personality and self-development.

TEZPUR UNIVERSITY



The establishment of Tezpur University is one of the outcomes of the Assam Accord, along with the establishment of Assam University and Indian Institute of Technology Guwahati, by an Act of Parliament, in 1994. The then Prime Minister of India, Shri P.V. Narasimha Rao, chaired the opening of the university.



The university campus is at Napaam, about 15 km east of Tezpur, the headquarters of the Sonitpur district of Assam. Napaam is a rural area surrounded by people of diverse caste, religion and language. The university campus is spread across 262 acres (1.06 km²) of land and is bounded by pucca walls. University is linked by a PWD road from the National Highway No. 37A at almost the midpoint between Kalia-Bhomora Bridge and Mission Chariali. Tezpur is linked by road and rail with the rest of the state and the country. There is a tri-weekly flight between Kolkata and Tezpur.

The university has four schools of studies which is divided into 27 departments and additional centres and cells.

- School of Sciences
- School of Humanities & Social Sciences
- School of Management Sciences
- School of Engineering

Tezpur University was ranked 801-1000 in the world by the *Times Higher Education World University Rankings* of 2020 and 251-300 in Asia. The *QS World University Rankings* ranked it 215 in Asia in 2020. In India it was ranked 65th overall by the *National Institutional Ranking Framework* of 2020 and 39th among universities.

The objectives of this Central University as envisaged in the statutes are that it shall strive to offer employment oriented and interdisciplinary courses to meet the local and regional aspirations and the development needs of the state of Assam and also offer courses and promote research in areas which are of special and direct relevance to the region and in emerging areas in Science and Technology.

LIST OF EVENTS

All the events and programs which were organised or were participated in by our cadets are listed here in chronological order of occurrence, starting from August 2019 to July 2020.

August 2019

- **Volunteering in Induction Programme (27th July to 21st August 2019)**

Purpose of the **Student Induction Program** is to help new students adjust and feel comfortable in the new environment, inculcate in them the ethos and culture of the institution, help them build bonds with other students and faculty members, and expose them to a sense of larger purpose and self-exploration.

The newly inducted engineering students were first introduced to the senior cadets of NCC through the induction program. They voluntarily used to take part in the program during the early morning yoga session and evening sports session as mentors.

- They were there to guide and motivate the students for doing well in those fitness programs.
- They volunteered to take the attendance, which was quite a tiring job.
- Volunteering as mentors in the Induction Programme really helped in advertising NCC.

- **Selection of new Cadets into NCC (3rd & 4th August 2019)**

In the history of NCC in Tezpur University, for the first time a fair selection process was conducted by the seniors. Before this year names for NCC were taken in a first come first serve basis which was very inefficient as:

- Students who were not very keen but just wanted to try it once gave their names. As a result, if they lost interest, they sometimes left it mid-way or became irregular.
- Deserving candidates who were physically and mentally fit and were also genuinely interested in NCC were denied the opportunity.
- Due to lack of interest in many of the cadets, they were not willing to interact with their fellow cadets and thus the feeling of family and oneness within the unit was lacking.
- As some cadets lacked zeal and enthusiasm, they were unwilling to put their best foot forward while participating in events. Some even did not want to take part at all.

But now the scenario has changed for the better. As an efficient selection procedure has been put in place keeping the primary objectives as:

- Only the interested and deserving students should get the valuable seats.
- People who are not as committed to NCC or have other activities which they prioritize over NCC are filtered.

As only interested candidates are selected, the turn out ratio in events has increased manifolds and more classes have been conducted this year than ever before and everyone was willing to take part in regular classes.

The Selection Procedure consisted of three parts:

- Physical Test: 10 points
- Drill Test: 5 points
- Personality Test/ Interview: 20 points
- Previous experience in NCC/ Scouts & Guides: 2 points

Most emphasis was given on the interview cum personality test as it is something which tested the interest of the applicants towards NCC. As many students were there who may not have been physically very fit at that time but can achieve the required level of fitness eventually during the NCC drill and exercise sessions, provided they have the right attitude and dedication.

The drill test was done to check who had some experience in the field of drill and marchpast and who were totally new to it. Some of the students who claimed to have had experience in NCC or Scouts & Guides previously got the opportunity to prove their mettle.

The interview round was conducted in the end where the below mentioned questions were asked:

- Say something about yourself. (Including hobbies and achievements)
- Why do you want to join NCC?
- Why should we choose you?

(These 3 questions provided insight into the personality and character of the aspirant.)

- Few questions related to NCC and the Indian Army.
- And lastly one of the most important question was to sort according to priority: Academies, NCC, other activities which generally included their hobbies.

(This question helped the interviewers to understand the level of commitment the aspirant has towards NCC.)

The whole selection procedure was conducted in two batches, first one was held from 0930 hours (9:30am) to 1400 hours (2:00pm) and the second batch was called at 1800 hours (6:00pm) to 2130 hours (9:30pm).

The next day, i.e., on 4th August 2019 the results were declared. 117 students were interviewed out of which there were 40 girls which was an unexpectedly high turnout. Only 25 of them were selected, 13 girls and 12 boys.

From 6th August, training for the upcoming Independence Day started. Both senior and junior cadets worked dedicatedly to be able to perform well on the day of the event.

Insight by Cadet Aditya Srivastava: I have previously attended NCC camps in school days. But by seeing the level of work and the feeling of oneness that is there among the cadets of Tezpur University I was very fascinated. Also, I was the last one to be interviewed on the day of selection as I arrived at the last moment when they were about to pack up after a day's work. Yet they allowed me to appear for the process and I got selected. I am incredibly grateful to them for overlooking the fact that I was late that day and conducting the selection in a fair manner.

• **Plantation Drive (10th August 2019)**

On 10th August, the NCC team of Tezpur University, led by Lt. (Dr.) Hitesh Sharma and SUO Saunak Chowdhury organized a plantation drive and planted saplings in the university campus. It was done to:

- Create awareness among the new students regarding the importance of the flora in the university and make them understand that they, as a part of University, are responsible for preserving it.
- Set an example for other so that more trees get planted.
- A small step towards creating a better environment and save Mother Nature.

- **Practice for Independence Day (6th to 14th August 2019)**

As our first event as a cadet of NCC Tezpur University was approaching we started practicing day and night to make it successful. We were just selected a week ago and everyone was nervous about their first event, but our seniors helped us and led us in such a way that we have a very successful Independence Day. It was all due to the coordination between newly selected cadets and seniors along with their hard work which brought the best in them.

Our SUO Saunak Chowdhury distributed all the new cadets under three groups, making Sergeant Saugat Deb , Sergeant Mandeep Singh and Sergeant Trishti panging the leaders of the different companies and they did an exceptional job in making the new cadets understand and get familiar with their role.

On 14th August there was a dress rehearsal for the junior cadets. Seniors not only helped to put on the accessories but also explained the importance and meaning of each.

Once everyone was dressed up, our ANO sir gave a motivational speech about giving our best and doing well the next day. He also gave us tips to not feel tired and faint while standing still in the sun.

Insight by Lance Corporal Soumi Purkayastha: I would like to give light on the day our uniforms were given. The feel of wearing khaki for the first time (except a few who had previously been a part of NCC) was something that cannot be penned down. It is a memory we all shall treasure forever.

- **73rd Independence Day (15th August 2019)**

And finally came the most important day of the month of August, India's 73rd Independence Day.



The event was to officially start at 9am. But all cadets reached the venue at 6:30am to make sure that all preparations were properly in coordination and place. Checking of uniform was done followed by the final practice.

All the NCC Cadets were divided into two contingents, the first contingent was of the SW Cadets (girls) which was led by Under Officer Sobina Yashmin and the second contingent was of the SD Cadets (boys) which was led by Sergeant Saugat Deb. There was another contingent of the Home Guards. All the three contingents were Centrally Commanded by Under Officer Lakshyajeet Gogoi of NCC. The Chief Guest of the day, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor Sir was piloted by Sergeant Mandeep

Kumar Singh, Sergeant Trishti Panging, Corporal Preetishree Gogoi and Lance Corporal Chau Kingtana Chautang.



The event started from 9 am with drill by the NCC cadets, followed by the Nirikshan (Inspection) of the Contingents by the Hon'ble Chief Guest. Then the national flag was hoisted by the Hon'ble Chief Guest, Prof. Vinod Kumar Jain, Vice Chancellor of Tezpur University, hoisting of flag was followed by the National Anthem and a speech by the Hon'ble Chief Guest on 'Commitment to Self'. Once the event was over, sweets and refreshments were provided to all the cadets.

September 2019

- **Interaction with Adm. Officer, 5 Assam Bn (7th September 2019)**

Lt. Col. Amit Mohan Sharma, Administrative Officer of 5 Assam Bn NCC, gave a visit to the University to meet the newly inducted first year cadets. The senior cadets were also present in the interactive session. He shared his in-depth knowledge of topics such as leadership and thinking pattern for cracking the SSB examination. He also shared some great adventure experiences from his life. Few of his other students from different unit joined us too.

He started with the topic 'Leadership'. Each cadet present there were asked to participate by listing and describing various leadership qualities mixed with own life experiences. The next topic was about the thinking patter required to crack the SSB exam. This topic was related to the former one and the main point which was made clear by sir was that *"each person who applies for SSB to get selected needs to have few or most of the leadership qualities like communication, integrity, accountability, empathy etc."*

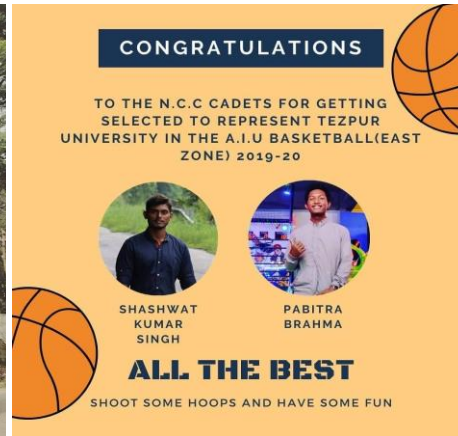

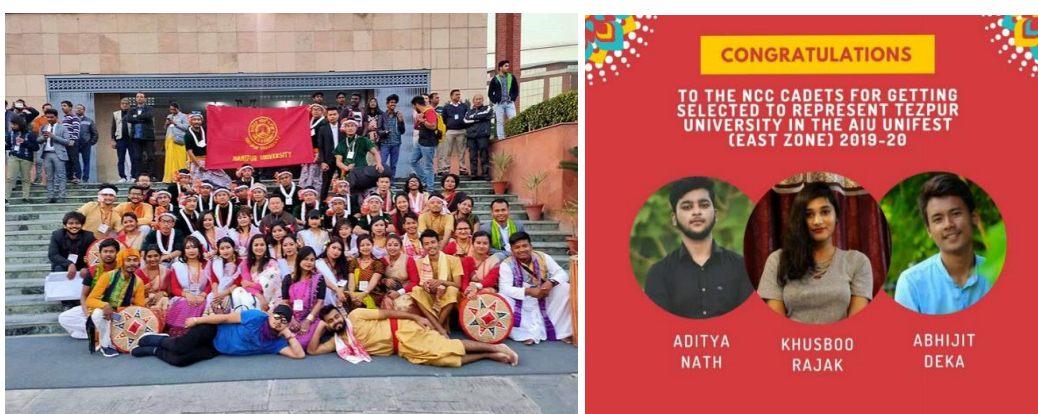

Insight by Cadet Sanjana Singha: ANO Lt. (Dr.) Hitesh Sharma in conversation with Honourable Vice-Chancellor Prof. Vinod Kumar Jain, Lt. Col. Amit Mohan Sharma and ADPE R.R. Singh Sir, discussed regarding the future prospects of NCC TU Unit and how it was in fact necessary to encourage upcoming students in joining NCC, introduce new ways of interacting with the mass and give an exposure to the ways in which the Indian Army with their untiring efforts serve the nation and how the youth of the nation should also be inspired to do the same with zeal and a sense of vigour. - **Selection of Cadets for SSB Capsule at New Delhi**

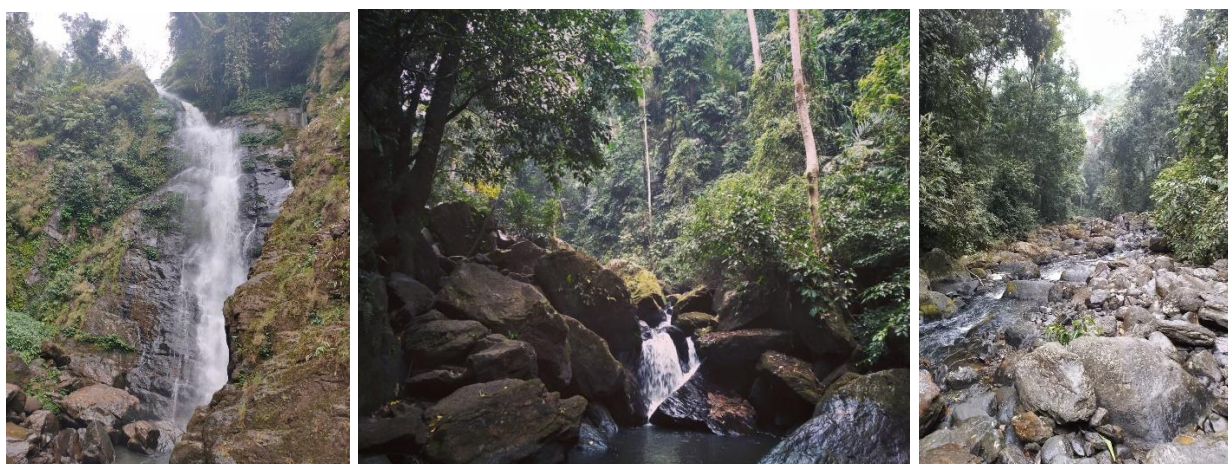

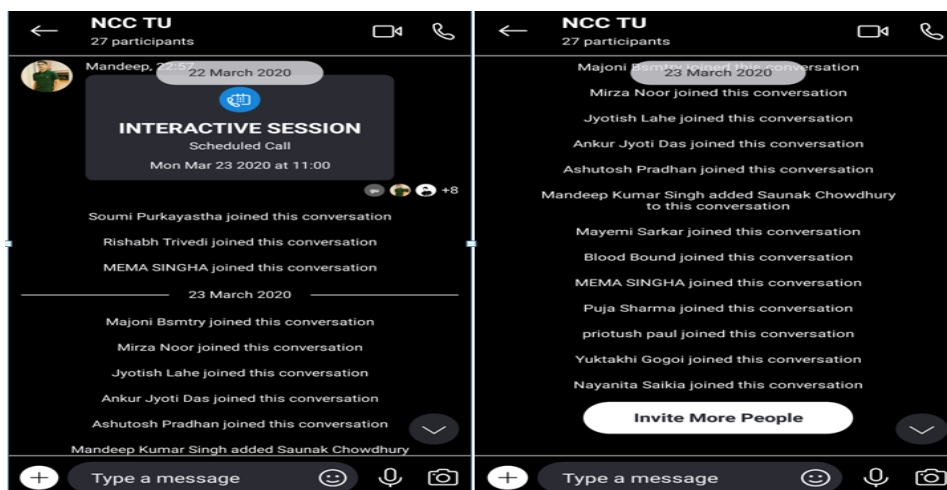

An interactive session was held via video conference between the cadets from first year, second year and third year on 23rd March 2020 at 11.00 am.

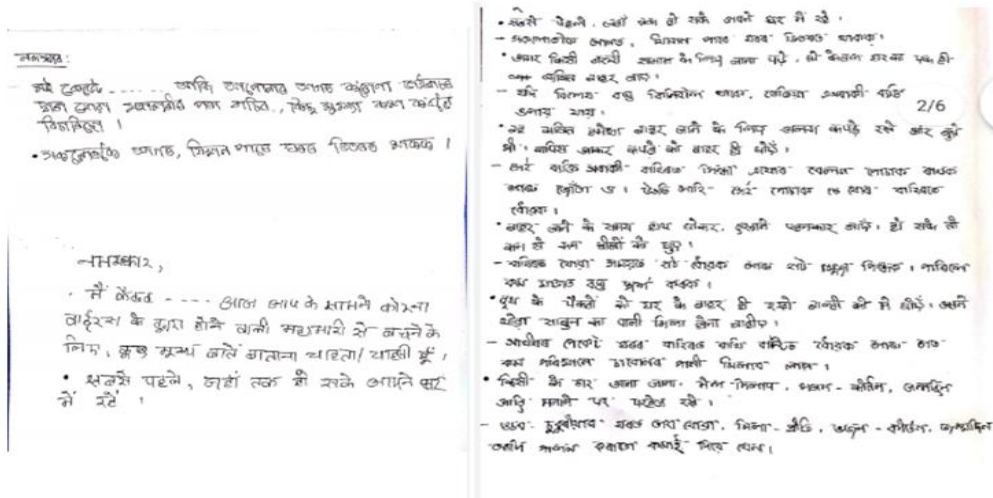

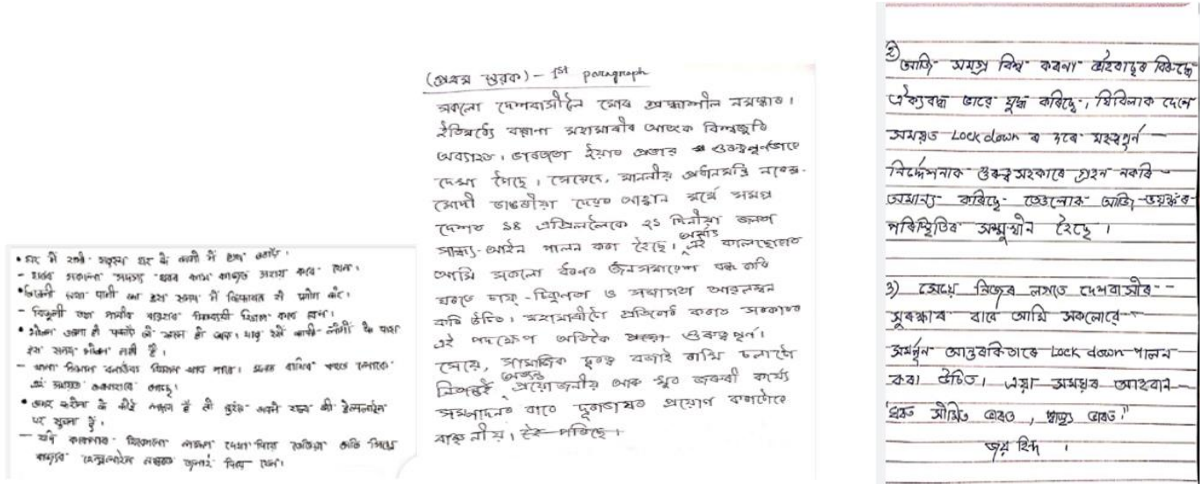
• **Script translation for awareness video against COVID-19 (28th March 2020)**

The cadets involved in preparing the script were Cadet Darshana Baruah, Cadet Mirza Noor, Cadet Joyshree Dutta and Cadet Abhijit Deka.



Insight by Cadet Ankur Jyoti Das: This event was a commendable effort on behalf of NCC in raising awareness about the ongoing pandemic. This massive youth organization has always been on the forefront in raising voice when various issues troubling the society have arisen. Since NCC's inception, its cadets have contributed during natural calamities like floods, cyclone among other events. The COVID-19 pandemic could in no ways deafen the enthusiasm NCC cadets carry in them.

April 2020

- **COVID-19 Training (8th April 2020)**

This event comprised of an online training module organised by MHRD to train the NCC cadets on the Diksha platform to assist the personnel of medical and essential services on the field.

The Narendra Modi government decided to rope in National Cadet Corps (NCC) volunteers aged 18 or above, to help the Indian civil infrastructure in the fight against the widening COVID-19 outbreak.

The NCC has moved to help the civilian authorities by extending the services of its cadets under a program called 'Exercise NCC Yogdan'. The tasks envisaged for cadets include **manning of helpline/call centres, distribution of relief materials/medicines/food/essential commodities, community assistance, data management and queue and traffic management.**

However, the cadets would not be employed in handling of law and order situation or for active military duties or at hot spots, said the guidelines.

Only Senior Division volunteer cadets above 18 years of age will be employed. They should be employed in small cohesive groups of eight to 20 under the supervision of Permanent Instructor Staff or/and an Associate NCC Officer.

The online training module comprised of interactive videos made by cadets from different regional directorates which comprised basic guidelines to maintain personal safety and hygiene, the norms for working the duty assigned and the don'ts during the assignment for the period. It also consisted of Q&As to revise the learning in a module and audio modules in some parts.



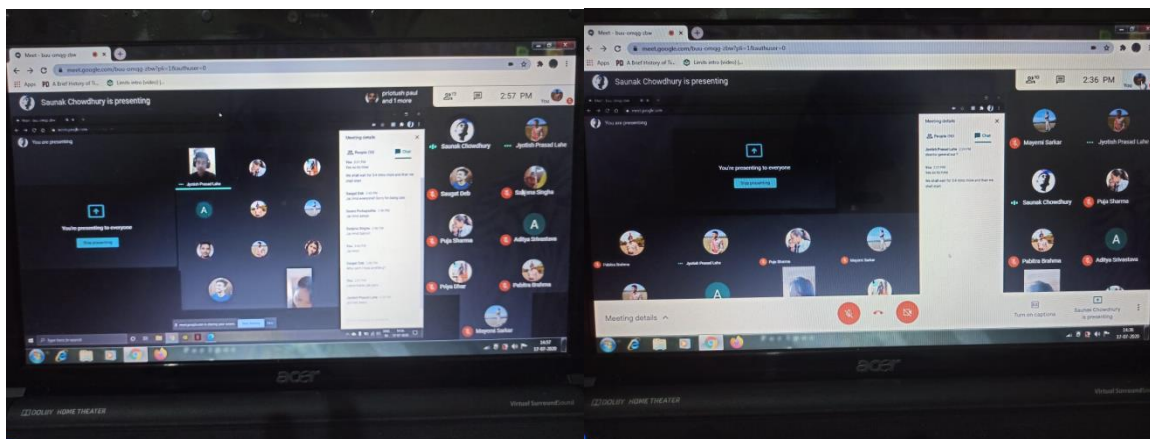
After completion of the online course the cadets were awarded a digital certificate in recognition of completion of the course.

Insight by Cadet Ashutosh Pradhan: The current onset of the pandemic has been deemed as very unprecedented which caused a major shockwave to the national administration, civil infrastructure as well as the economy. NCC being a powerful organization with large number of cadets enrolled is the largest youth organization in the country. The massive number has been **engaged in logistics and supply chain management duties, ensuring supply of essential food materials, medicines, assisting in traffic duties** etc. This further enhances the exposure of the cadet in such challenging conditions and builds his/her decision making and life skills as well.

May 2020

- **Video Conference (8th, 14th & 22nd May 2020)**

On 8th May 2020, we discussed about the prevailing pandemic i.e. the Corona Virus disease (COVID-19) and its impact on our daily life.



COVID-19 is an infectious disease caused by the novel coronavirus. Most people infected with the COVID-19 virus will experience mild to moderate respiratory illness and recover without requiring special treatment. Older people, and those with underlying medical problems like cardiovascular disease, diabetes, chronic respiratory disease, and cancer are more likely to develop serious illness.

Till now the number of coronavirus cases in India have increased to 1,078,782, deaths are 26,838, and people recovered are only 677,856. And the number of cases across the world is 14,452,529, deaths are 605,614, and people recovered are 8,636,819.

In the video conference, each cadet spoke about what problems that came up during this sensitive situation in their area. People who stay in rural areas were least affected by coronavirus during the month of May. But people who were staying in urban areas were highly affected and day by day the coronavirus cases were increasing. Everyone was scared to step out of their house even for buying essential items.

Even after three months of this pandemic, people are seen without wearing masks, no use of sanitizers, and no social distancing. Just because of this attitude of the people, the coronavirus cases are increasing in high speed.

Conclusion of the video conference:

1. We should clean our hands often with soap or alcohol based sanitizer whenever it is necessary like after returning from market, places crowded with people and even after any physical contact such as receiving money or taking items with your hands from the shopkeeper as this act is a major source of spread of Covid-19.
2. Maintaining a safe distance of about 1 to 2m from people is particularly important and more distance from people who are coughing or sneezing continuously.
3. Wearing masks before going out of the house is the most important act.

On 14th May 2020, another video conference was done with all the cadets in which we had a group discussion about impact of COVID-19 on the Education System.

Covid-19 has thrown education all over the world in a loop. The impact is immense as education institutions from Harvard to the IIT are closed. Recognized boards have postponed or cancelled the examinations for all schools, colleges and universities.

The sudden shift to online learning without any planning has created the risk for all the students to pay full attention to their study. Moreover, the Covid-19 pandemic has put the spotlight on the ever-increasing structural imbalance in school education in terms of rural-urban, rich and poor and gender divide.

The situation is difficult when one looks at the rural schools and colleges. Many students in rural areas may not have access to smartphones or computers and even if they do the net connectivity may not be high as in urban areas and as a result they are deprived of the right to education.

Rather than this it is a curse for the students who are graduating in this Covid-19 recession. Final year students are even experiencing a lot of panic and uncertainty when it comes to the employment prospects as recruitment is on hold and not only their education is disrupted but in absence of hard academic indicators such as grades and marks they are worried that they won't be able to get a job in this pandemic situation.

Even after hearing student's problems the government is conducting exams for college and university students which is quite despondent for all the students.

Conclusion:

1. It is evident that the present pandemic will not only affect the economy adversely, but it will also affect the education system as no one is sure how long it will take to normalize the whole situation.
2. Moreover, the education system is especially vulnerable since mass gathering cannot be avoided in classrooms and even online classes cannot prove to be effective substitute as interaction between teachers and students is a crucial component of teaching and can't be replicated with online classes.

On 22nd May 2020, we discussed how all cadets made the lockdown productive.

It is an unprecedented experience for everyone during this lockdown period due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Almost everyone is going through a rough phase and finding it challenging to deal with the abrupt change in lifestyle. Since the numbers of Corona patients are soaring up across the world, nobody believes the government is going to lift off the lockdown any time soon.

As we know that this pandemic is not going to end so easily, it will take time to normalize the whole situation. So, we can do something productive even in our home as it will help us not to get bored and our mind will be refreshed by learning and acknowledging new things. There are many things we can do at home like spending quality time with family, trying to cook new dishes at home, and learning new career skills, reading new good books, and learning new techniques from YouTube and playing indoor games with family, etc.

As we are sitting at home, it may lead to an increase in body weight which is unhealthy, so we can do yoga and exercises to make our body fit and active. The present situation has given us a chance to explore our talents in a better way. We have more than enough time to enhance our skills and

work on it so that whenever this lockdown opens and everything normalizes, we can again work actively like we used to.

At the end of the group discussion all the cadets have talked how they made lockdown productive, some of which is identified in conclusion.

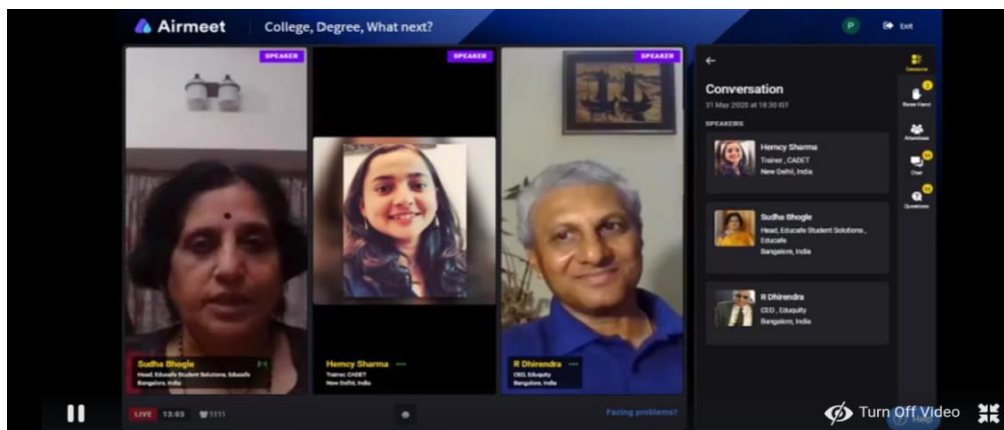
Conclusion:

Cadets from many other states have also attended this program. They asked the presenters regarding their future and how they can make a career in Indian Army.

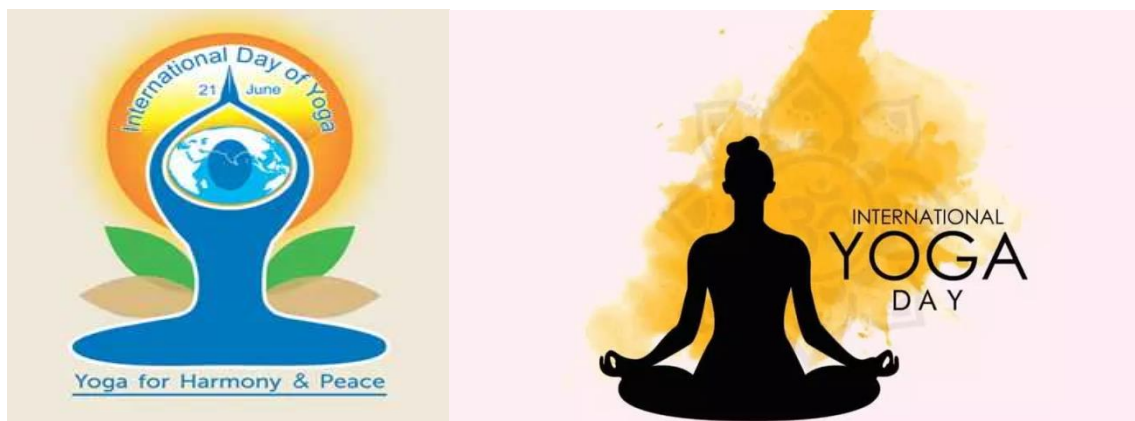
The CADET program had cleared many doubts of the cadets and helped them to understand their strengths, values, personality and skills.

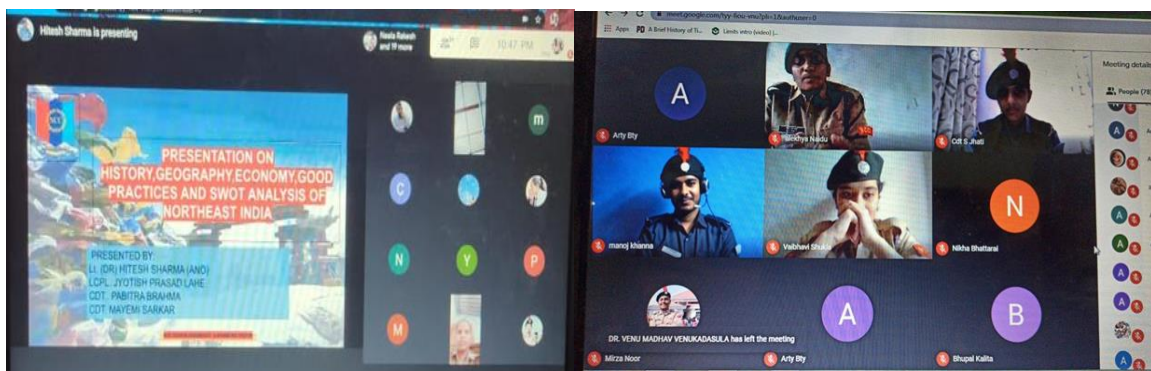
- **First ever online EBSB Camp (25th to 30th June 2020)**

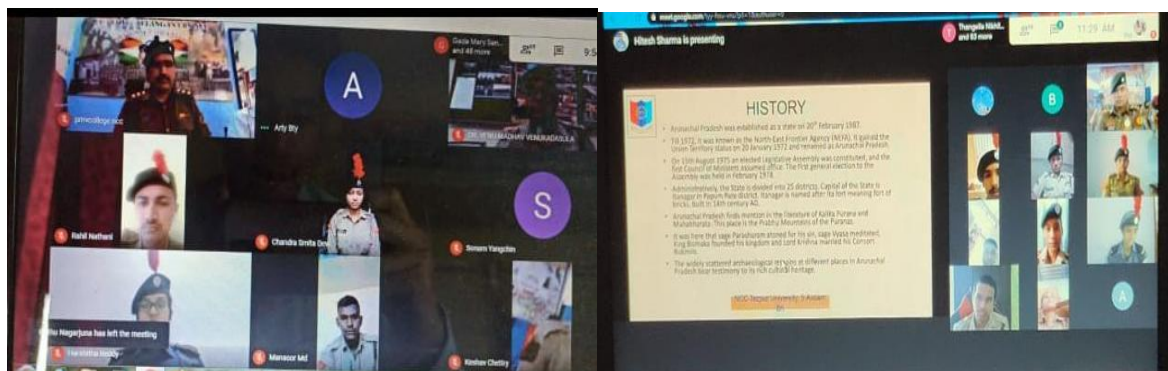

• 21st Kargil Vijay Diwas (24th & 26th July 2020)

Kargil Vijay Diwas, named after the successful Operation Vijay, is celebrated in India on 26 July. On this date in 1999 India successfully took command of the high outposts which had been notoriously captured by Pakistan. The Kargil war was fought for more than 60 days, ended on 26th July and resulted in loss of life on both the sides.

Kargil is a town in Kargil district and the part capital of the Indian Union territory of Ladakh. Kargil is the second largest town in Ladakh after Leh. It is located 204 km to the east of Srinagar and 234 km west of Leh to the east. Kargil is the center of the Siachen River valley, historically known as Pung.

The youngest person to ever be awarded the Param Vir Chakra
He was the sole survivor of an attack on Tiger Hill in which he took 15 bullets. He was a part of the Chetak platoon that recaptured three strategic bunkers on Tiger Hill on July 4, 1999.
He was also called the Tiger of Disha: the Lion of Kargil, the Kargil Hero, and so on.
Captain Vikram Batra was awarded the Param Vir Chakra, India's highest medal for gallantry, posthumously.

KARGIL VIJAY DIWAS
Kargil Vijay Diwas is celebrated on 26 July every year in honour of the Kargil War's success. This day is celebrated in the Kargil area and the national capital New Delhi, where the Prime Minister of India pays homage to the soldiers at Amar-Jawan Jyoti in India Gate every year. Functions are also organized all over the country to commemorate the contributions of the armed forces.
The year 2020 marks 21st anniversary of victory in Operation Vijay popularly known as Kargil War.

START OF WAR
Indian posts along the LoC at the mountain peaks were vacated before winter. The Pakistanis did likewise on their side of the Line of Control (LoC). Most of the roads to these posts were either not motorable or non-existent. Artillery guns were inadequate. Surveillance by high-technology equipment such as unmanned Aerial Vehicles were not there. The Pakistani Army took advantage of these shortcomings, and intruded into Muskhok, Dras, Kargil, Batak and Turkul sub-sectors, between Zaski and Leh. They crossed the LoC and intruded 4-10 km into Indian territory. One of the factors behind the Kargil war in 1999 when Pakistan sent infiltrators to occupy vacated Indian posts across the Line of Control was their belief that India would be forced to withdraw from Sacher in exchange of a Pakistani withdrawal from Kargil.

OBJECTIVE
The main objective behind celebrating Kargil Vijay Diwas is to evoke feeling of nationalism and patriotism especially amongst youth and to pay homage to valiant soldiers.

ABOUT THE WAR
Gen. Malik briefed the Cabinet Committee on Security about reports of infiltration along the border on 24 May. By 25 May, India had launched Operation Vijay.
The Kargil War was costly one for India - 527 soldiers died and 1,363 injured and the terrain put the Indian Army at a great disadvantage.
The war officially ended on 26 July. The day has since been marked as Kargil Vijay Diwas (Victory Day) in India. By the end of the war, India had resumed control of all territory north and east of the Line of Control, as established in July 1972 as per the Shimla Accord.

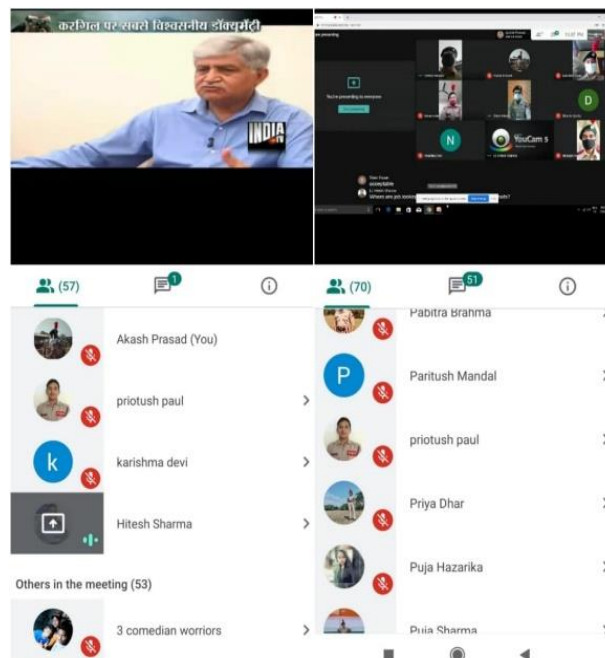

Other events such as drill competition between colleges and movie screening will also be conducted for encouraging the youth to join the Services and contribute to nation building.
- 2. Vice Chancellor's Commendation Card:** To appreciate the one who worked for the betterment of NCC in University and to encourage others to do the same, Vice Chancellor's Commendation Card will be awarded.
- 3. Netaji Subash Chandra Bose Trophy:** To appreciate and to increase the participation of cadets an annual trophy/prize will be awarded to the best cadet of the year as an honour to one of the most famous NCC cadet of our country Netaji Subash Chandra Bose.

- 4. Board of Honour for ANO/CTO & SUO:** A board of honour will be maintained every year which will behold the name of the ANO/CTO and SUO of NCC Tezpur University and their session over the years.
- 5. Board of Honour for the winners of VC commendation card & Netaji Subash Chandra Bose Trophy:** A board for the yearly winners of the above two prizes will be maintained as a record for the future so that the new cadets can get inspired and work hard.
- 6. Renovation of the NCC room:** Our NCC room renovation is one of the most needed activity and should be done in the next session somehow or other.
- 7. More participation of cadets in national programmes and events:** In present there are lot cadets who have participated or represented our University in the national level competitions and have bought laurels for University but in the coming session we would like to increase that number as much as we can. We will also try to reduce the gap between the Administration and the students as much as we can for the bright future of our cadets and University.
- 8. Releasing Yearly NCC magazine:** An annual magazine including all the events that took place in that year should be released so that more students learn about NCC and get inspired to join it. This magazine will also work as a document for the new cadets and will be extremely useful.
- 9. Conduct of Self-defence classes:** Self-defence classes will be conducted for anyone from the university to learn. Classes will be taken by the trainers of NCC (Army personnel).
- 10. Organising motivational & informational lectures:** We will try to invite Defence Personals and other prominent Administrative Officers to guide the university students on SSB, Civil Services exams and Defence exams.
- 11. Increasing the number of NCC vacancies:** We will try to increase the number of vacancies in Tezpur University NCC unit from current 60 Cadets to 100 Cadets.

These are the visions/plans of NCC Tezpur University for the next session and we hope to conduct all of the events that is mentioned here and many more but it will only be possible if Administration along with Students work as one which we think is very much achievable.
