#### Welcome to Golaghat... Welcome to H. P. B. Girls' College...

Golaghat, principally a residential and educational township has a long history of existence. Situated at the bank of Dhansiri, 25km south to the National Highway 37 and 9km east to NH39, Golaghat is also the headquarters of the district by the same name. The town has acquired an elegant look through development works in addition to its age long greenery and pristine beauty.

Of the three major colleges in the town, Hemo Prova Borbora Girls' College is the only institute of higher education for women. #### THEME OF THE WORKSHOP:

Assam has been home to more than thirty ethnic groups and similar number of linguistic groups apart from the dominant Assamese and Bengali speaking populations. The major media of instructions in educational institutions in Assam have been Assamese and English in the Brahmaputra Valley, and Bengali and English in the Barak Valley. Identifying the second language for different learners is a major and critical problem in the educational institutions in Assam. For different learners from different linguistic backgrounds other than Assamese and Bengali, the second language may be identified as both Assamese and Bengali as well in the institutions where media of instructions have been the two said languages. And same can be considered as English for the learners with Assamese and Bengali as first language in the same institutions. But while teaching English to both sets of learners, little thought is given to identify the second language for them. Thus in these institutions English becomes a third language to some learners, taught in a second language which is either Assamese or Bengali. Now, looking at the learners, who are taught in English as medium of instructions, we have a setting where English is tried to put as first language, but the trainees are required to learn the target language like acquiring it. But in the



context of the state this setting is not perfect and the trainers also mostly do not use English as first language. Thus we have different

and the trainers also mostly do not use English as first language. Thus we have different second languages identified. First, considering English as a target language we need to consider the role of identifying first or second languages in the process of target language learning. This is not the end of analyzing the problems of language learning. Thus at the second place, identifying the second language has also become significant in the state because of several language conflicts which have been witnessed in the recent past. Unfortunately, this significant problem area has not been brought under the purview of the language teaching/learning in the state.

The workshop, therefore, aims to address such problem areas which directly impact the language teaching process.
